#### President's Report

Jean Copland, editor of Scribbles 'N Bits, the newsletter of the Georgia Council of Teachers of English, graciously included a news item about our statewide youth poetry contests in her fall issue. This will bring our contest to the attention of 800 to 1.000 English teachers throughout the state. A half-page advertisement will appear in the winter issue of Scribbles 'N Bits reminding teachers to look for our contest flyer which will have been mailed to all schools in October. Hopefully, these initiative will result in wider participation in the contests by young poets from "Rabun Gap to Tybee light."

Our inventory of poetry books has been reduced by more than 300 volumes, which were purchased and donated to a national literacy advocacy foundation. The purchase enriched our GPS treasury. It is hoped that the books will enrich the intellectual lives of the students in schools whose libraries were devastated by spring floods in Texas.

Under the indefatigable leadership of Jean Mahavier, small groups of members have responded to requests from English teachers at a handful of schools--many in the metro area--to conduct student poetry workshops. These have been exceptionally well-received and the teams

are almost always reinvited. Our poetry-in-theschools program is reaching young persons at a critical stage of their education and getting them to enjoy writing poetry, or at least appreciate it more. Would that such a team had come to my classroom!

The problem is that Georgia has 800 school systems, and we are only scratching the surface.

One of our board members has access to the Carnegie Foundation It is inclined to consider favorably grant requests directed toward the field of education. With the right proposal, we might obtain a substantial grant and be able to extend Jean's good work throughout the state. I am appointing an ad hoc committee to study this problem and make recommendations to your board.

Your board has voted a \$100 contribution to the NFSPS Scholarship fund. This fund is a poetry manuscript competition for college juniors or seniors. The two winners get \$500 scholarships and their books published. Individuals are encouraged to support this fund with tax-

deductible donations to Madelyn Eastlund at 310 S. Adams St. Beverly Hills, FL 34465.

Of 12 new members who joined recently, three came to us as a direct result of our having met at Young Harris.

We now have 26 collegelevel English faculty members on our newsletter mailing list. We need to be better known by these friends of poetry. Please keep those names coming to Margaret Langford or me.

I leave you with this Joan Miro thought: "The painting rises from the brush strokes as a poem rises from the words. The meaning comes later."

The cost of the catered luncheon at the October meeting will be \$12, which includes pre-meeting coffee, juice, pastries, and tax


Seating capacity in the Eubanks Room is limited to 50 persons. To enjoy the catered luncheon, it will be necessary to purchase a ticket at our registration table.

## Directions to Shorter College

- •I-75 north to Exit 290 for GA 20.
- •Turn left at the bottom of the exit ramp.
- •At 2.3 miles, reach intersection of US 411 south. See the large sign; "To Rome."
- •At about 1 block, bear right onto the entrance ramp for US 411 south. See another "To Rome" sign.

**NOTE:** It is confusing that it is US 411 *south* in that you are going *north* to Rome. Accept it as a weird route designation.

- •At 2.5 miles, exit right on US 411 south and GA 20 west. Another "To Rome" sign.
- •At 18.9 miles reach a fork. Proceed straight ahead for Rome on US 27, GA 52, and GA 20.
- •At less than 1/10 mile, bear right for Rome. Keep following GA 20.
- •At 4.1 miles, turn left on Sherwood Rd. "Shorter College" is also on that overhead road sign.

**NOTE:** After passing Horseleg Creek Rd., get in the left lane in preparation for your left turn on Sherwood Rd.

- •At 1/10 mile, turn left into the Shorter College gate.
- •At 1/10 mile, bear left for the administrative offices and visitors' circle.
- •At 3/10 mile, pass the main quadrangle and visitors' circle.

- •Turn right and park behind Cooper Fine Arts Building which is the last building on your right on the quadrangle.
- •If your passenger has difficulty walking, turn right into the visitors' circle, go around it, and let your passenger out in front of the Cooper Building. There's an elevator to our second floor meeting room. Then exit out of the circle and park behind Cooper.

HINT: Bring your camera and have your photo made in the sunken garden on your left as you reach the main quadrangle.

#### Out Guest Speakers: Shorter College Meeting, October

#### Dr. Thelma R. Hall

Dr. Thelma R. Hall is Professor of English and Chair of the Division of Humanities at Shorter College in Rome, Georgia. She and her husband Dr. Wilson Hall came to Shorter College in 1964. Dr. Hall earned her B.A. and M.A. in English from Auburn University and her Ph.D. in English from the University of Alabama. Her major areas for teaching are Modern Literature, Southern Literature, and Creative Writing, Dr. Hall frequently attends professional conferences where she delivers papers in these fields and presents readings of her poetry. She is a member of the Georgia Poetry Society and has been named one of this organization's artistic directors. Her book ,Sunlight and Stones, was nominated for the Author of the Year in poetry in 1989 by Georgia Writers, Inc.

Sunlight and Stones received the 1999 Benjamin Franklin Award for Poetry/Literary Criticism, given in Los Angeles by Publishers Marketing Association. Besides this volume, Dr. Hall has had seventy-five poems published in various literary journals and other sources. including the following: The New Laurel Review, The Chattahoochee Review, Number One. The Reach of Song (yearbook of the Georgia Poetry Society), and many others. She has published a chapbook of poems entitled Among Chinese about her experiences teaching English in China at Zhengzhou University and Yantai University, on four separate occasions from 1985-1995. Her poems have won fourteen awards, including one Editor's Choice for best poem in the issue, four first place awards, four second place awards, one Special Recognition award, and four Honorable Mentions.

She also is the faculty editor and sponsor for the college's literary magazine, *The Chimes*.

#### Alice Taylor-Colbert

Alice Taylor-Colbert received her B.A. degree in History and English from Shorter College, and her M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in American Studies from Emory University... Her research interest is in the American South, particularly southern women and the Cherokee people. Her most recent publication, "Cherokee Women and Cultural Change" in Women of the American South, reflects that interest. In the spring of 200 she was fortunate to have a sabbatical to conduct Cherokee research in Oklahoma and in archives around the South.

At Shorter College, Dr. Taylor-Colbert is an Associate Professor of History, Chair of the History and Political Science Department, and

Director of the College Museum and Archives. In the latter position, she has assisted with the college's 125<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebration through producing exhibits, a historical slide show, and other materials. In March 1999, she sponsored a conference-- "Georgia Women Meeting Challenges"--in conjunction with the Georgia Women of Achievement.

She is actively involved in a number of museums and historical societies.

Beth Gylys is an Assistant Professor of **English and Creative** Writing at Georgia State University in Atlanta, GA. Her collection of poems Bodies that Hum won the Gerald Cable First Book Award and was published by Silverfish Review Press. Her poems have appeared in the Paris Review. #### GENERAL GUIDELINES FOR GEORGIA POETRY SOCIETY CONTESTS

These rules apply to all GPS contests except where superseded by guidelines for individual competitions.

- By submitting entries to any GPS contest, entrants affirm that the poetry is their own original, unpublished work to which they own all rights; that it is not currently entered in any other contest or submitted elsewhere for publication; and that it has not won a monetary award of over \$10 in any previous contest.
- Anyone who has won higher than honorable mention in either of the two major GPS annual contests, i.e. the Byron Herbert Reece or the Edward Davin Vickers contests, may not enter that contest the following year. This specific restriction applies only to these two contests.
- Each entry must be typed or neatly printed in English (except where noted) on one side of 8 1/2 x 11 inch paper, one poem per page.



- 4. Subject matter of poems submitted must be in good taste, contain no pornography, no sexual or racial slurs, no offensive language, and no obscenity. Winning poems may be published in *The Reach of Song*, the GPS's annual anthology. The publication goes to school and public libraries where young people may be among our reading audience. For this reason we are concerned that the anthology contain no inappropriate language.
- Submit two copies of each poem with the name of the contest in the upper right corner of both copies. Show the name and address of the poet under the name of the contest on one copy only. This entry format is important and should be carefully observed.

- 6. Any poem entered in a GPS contest that does not comply with these rules may be disqualified.
- Poems will not be returned. Non-winning poems will be destroyed.
- Make checks for entry fees payable to Georgia Poetry Society, not to the contest chairperson. Send entries with fee to the chairperson announced in the rules of each contest.
- A contest receiving fewer than 10 entries may be canceled and the fees refunded.
- 10. Each contest chairperson will secure judges who are not GPS members (except that youth contests may be judged by members). Entries are sent to the judges anonymously. The name of the judge for each contest will be mentioned on the list of winners.
- 11. The chairperson will announce the winners at the quarterly GPS meeting following the contest deadline. Winners not present will be notified and receive their awards by mail. Winners will also be posted on our web site.
- A list of winners will be sent to all entrants who include a SASE (self-addressed stamped envelope) with their submissions. Enclose a SASE with all inquiries.
- 13. No contestant may receive more than one monetary award in any individual contest. If a contestant is a multiwinner, he or she will receive the highest award only. Judges will choose alternates to cover this eventuality.
- 14. GPS reserves the right to publish, or not to publish, prizewinning poems in *The Reach of Song*. After publication by GPS, poets retain all rights

## Why I Enter Poetry Contests

Since I was a child, I have had the desire to entertain, edify, and fulfill some drive within by my writings of various kinds. I have been a newspaper reporter, a magazine book editor, and a fiction writer. In later life, my zeal filtered into poetry and a divine commission to reach some kind of audience, be it small. I became weary of primarily submitting poetry to magazines and journals which held it for months and sometimes

years before reaching a decision and publishing it or not.

Our contests and others give a date for decisions, so I began to major in sending to them, especially to those that published winning poems. Winnings are indeed spotty and scarce. There are many more disappointments than successes. If I win ten percent of the time, I feel gratified. For instance, in the past five years or so I have sent about twentyfive poems each year to the contests of NFSPS. I have won 1 prize most of the years and been published in their

anthology. However, in 2000 I received only the consolation of three honorable mentions, no publication.

It is possible to conduct poetry marketing, in one sense, as a business. So state it on tax returns and list gains and losses. One can use this status to pay entrance fees, buy books, etc. And one has to make a profit only every five years!

Perhaps in the future, I may find a better way to live and write. So what is my counsel, if you asked? Write on if you feel the divine joy of perhaps serving humanity as a

poet. Then study, work, and pray with persistence and diligence. Gasp! I'll try to do that, too.

#### **Announcement of Winners**

#### The 2001 Margery Carlson Memorial Award Poetry Contest

This contest honors the memory of the late Margery Carlson. A distinguished past president of the Society, Ms. Carlson was instrumental in conceiving the first ever official Olympic Games poetry contest. The competition took place in conjunction with the 1996 Centennial Olympic Games held in Atlanta. She also obtained for the GPS the right to stage the 1999 convention of the National Federation of State Poetry Societies, although she passed away before seeing the event come to fruition. Margery's dedication to poetry and her always accessible presence are sorely missed by her family and wide circle of friends.

The contest drew a total of 66 entries of which 44 were from GPS members and 22 from non-members. Entries came from poets in CT, FL, GA, KY, MI, MO, NC, NH, OK, VA, and WA.

Theda Bassett of Murray, Utah judged the contest. Ms. Bassett is a past president of the Utah State Poetry Society and a much published poet and frequent contest winner. 
Her selections are as follows:

#### **Beginnings and Endings**

Lola Haskins

- •A lot of what we write is garbage at first. If you are not willing to write a lot of garbage, you'll never write well.
- •The beginning is the poem coming at you. It is the only chance you get to grab your reader.
- •The ending is its going away. You never have another chance to end well. Let the poem end only once.
- •At first writing, don't consciously keep your words connected. Let them flow almost without thinking.
- •When you finish with poems, you give them away. They no longer belong to you.
- •Don't use abstractions. They have been washed too often and are worn out. You have to add a lot of words to a poem to pay for an abstraction. Instead, go for the concrete expression or image.
- •Every single adjective needs to count for something. They're like spices in cooking: if you use too much, that's all you taste. They can be redundant. Example: "little girl."
  •Watch out for connectives. Where you can, use a period instead of "and."

NOTE: These are highlights of Lola Haskins' talk at the 2001 NFSPS national convention. Her work has appeared in Atlantic Monthly, London Review of Books, Prairie Schooner, Georgia Review, and elsewhere. She has published several books and teaches computer science at the University of Florida.

#### **Chairperson's Comment**

At first glance, the topic of the poem that I have selected to feature this month might seem a bit unusual.

However, on a closer reading, it becomes clear that the poet has chosen this particular subject in order to present her message of the oneness of all humankind. She describes the process of donating blood and, at the same time, she emphasizes the resulting unity that such a gift produces.

The compound adjectives used in the second stanza are especially powerful in their impact. Not only can the reader see the donor; he or she is also able to experience the events that take place by means of the descriptions presented here.

The poem is at once a plea for the gift of life, and also a memorable portrait of both the process and the results of donating blood.
