The current GPS President writes:

Here's what I propose: a Spontaneous Poetry chapbook.

Between now and Sept 22nd, I will take on 12 challenges for spontaneous poetry. That will leave a week to get the results printed as a chapbook, before my "feature" reading on Thursday October 1st in Columbus, GA. I won't be aiming for slick or pretty. This will be a "cheap" book that draws its energy from speed and uninhibited creativity. I might even include scans of some of the original handwritten pages. I also might include some of the earlier spontaneous poems. I won't be printing very many copies of this thing. I'd say no more than 125 or 150.

As for challenges/prompts, anything goes: random words, strange topic, specific form, an image, a question, a first line, phrase that must be used, a reference that must be included, etc.

I will spend 45 - 60 minutes on each challenge. Maybe longer if time permits that same day. I will only solicit the challenge on the day I will tackle the challenge, so

Our Feature Poet for the October 24th GPS Meeting is GPS Member **Lynn Pedersen**. Lynn's new book is [Theories of Rain](#). One of her poems has recently been featured on [Garrison Keillor's Writer's Almanac](#).

Lynn Pedersen's poems, essays and reviews have appeared in New England Review, Poet Lore, Southern Poetry Review, The Palo Alto Review, The Comstock Review, The Chattahoochee Review and Cider Press Review. She is a graduate of the Vermont College of Fine Arts MFA in Writing Program. She lives in Atlanta, Georgia.

Poetry Workshop Leader

Our Poetry Workshop leader for the October 24th GPS meeting will be **Scott Wilkerson**.

Carey Scott Wilkerson, poet and theorist, is a member of the English department at Columbus State University where he teaches composition, literature, and creative writing. His poems and speculative essays have appeared in journals including Eratio, zafusy, Amaryllis, and Word/for Word. He is a recipient of a 2008 residency fellowship from the Lillian E. Smith Center for Creative Arts. He considers himself a friendly avant-gardist but, in truth, has no clear idea of what that means. His book of poems *Threading Stone* will be published in late 2009 by New Plains Press. He is a member of the Georgia Poetry Society.

Scott's talk will take the form of an apologia for all the mistakes poets make and a celebration of failure as essential mechanism for finding the voice, shaping a style,

and speaking truth through art. Some questions we'll consider: Why are long poems so loved by poets and so hated by editors? What is "the tradition" and why is everyone so afraid of it? Why is it important to champion poets whose work you do not consider essential? Why must poetry fail so often in order to triumph in the end? And we'll have some fun thinking about the work we do.

Member Showcase

Our Member Showcase for the Oct. 24th meeting is Vice President, **Robert Simon**, Kennesaw State University. He will present from his two books: *Não Tirei Fotos*, *Os Sophíadas*

Dr. Robert Simon is an Assistant Professor of Spanish at KennesawStateUniversity. He earned his Bachelor of Arts and his Master of Arts degrees in Hispanic Language and Literatures in 2000 from BostonUniversity, and his Ph.D. in Literature from the University of Texas at Austin in 2006. He has taught both Spanish and Portuguese language, and has investigated the presence of Surrealism, Mysticism and postmodernism in Contemporary Peninsular Literatures. Dr. Simon is the Editor-in-Chief of The Kennesaw Tower (an undergraduate foreign language research journal) and Poetry in the Department of Foreign Languages (a website devoted to poetry in languages other than English).

His critical work includes a study on the work of the Portuguese Poet Joaquim Pessoa, as well as articles written on Spanish and Portuguese poetries. His poetry includes *New Poems from the Airplane and Graveyard* (Finishing Line Press, 2007), *Não Tirei Fotos* (Finishing Line Press, 2009), and *Os Sophíadas* (Apenas Livros, 2009), and other poems published in several journals across the nation, including *The Reach of Song*, *The American Poetry Journal* and *The New York Quarterly*. He explains his poetry as "an exploration of the intimate connection between love, death and the variance of language." He is married to a very, very patient woman with whom he has an even more patient daughter.

Directions

Callaway Gardens® is in Pine Mountain, Georgia, 60 minutes southwest of Atlanta and 30 minutes north of Columbus.

Note: If using an online mapping service like MapQuest, please use the address "5887 Georgia Highway 354." Please note that this address is for the Real Estate Office entrance and very close to the main entrance of Callaway Gardens.

Mountain Creek® Inn or The Villas at Callaway Gardens

If you are staying in the Inn or the Villas:

Please check in at the Mountain Creek Inn on U. S. Hwy. 27. You will not use the Gardens Entrance to get to your accommodations.

The Cottages at Callaway Gardens or the Lodge and Spa at Callaway Gardens

If you are checking in to a Cottage or the Lodge:

Please come to the Gardens entrance on Ga. Hwy. 18. Enter and take the first left (before the stone gated entrance), then take the second left. This will take you to the Lodge and Spa (formerly known as the Southern Pine). Inside the lobby, you will find the cottage or lodge check-in desk to your right.

Callaway Gardens entrance:

Use this entrance to visit any of our attractions, enjoy golf, fishing and bicycling, or to dine at the Discovery Cafe and Champions.

If you are traveling from:

Columbus, GA (30 miles) - Take Interstate 185 North to Ga. Hwy. 18 East (exit 34). Turn right off Hwy. 18 to the entrance of Callaway Gardens.

Atlanta (70 miles) - Take Interstate 85 South to Interstate 185 South (exit 21). From Interstate 185, exit at U. S. Hwy. 27 (exit 42). Follow Hwy. 27 South to Pine Mountain. In Pine Mountain, turn right onto Hwy. 354 West. Proceed to Ga. Hwy. 18 and turn left into Callaway Gardens.

Macon, GA (80 miles) - Take U. S. Hwy. 80 West to Ga. Hwy. 208 West to U. S. Hwy. 27 North. Proceed through Hamilton and past the Callaway Gardens Store (approximately 10 minutes). Remain on Hwy 27 and turn left into the Callaway Gardens Hwy 27 entrance.

Montgomery, AL (110 miles) - Take Interstate 85 to Ga. Hwy. 18 East (exit 2). Turn right off Hwy. 18 to the entrance of Callaway Gardens.

Albany, GA (110 miles) - Take Corridor Z (Ga. Hwy 280) to Columbus. In Columbus take Interstate 185 North to Ga. Hwy. 18 East (exit 34). Turn right off Hwy. 18 to the entrance of Callaway Gardens.

Birmingham, AL (150 miles) - Take U. S. Hwy. 280 East to Opelika and take Interstate 85 North to Ga. Hwy. 18 East (exit 2). Turn right off Hwy. 18 to the entrance of Callaway Gardens.

Tallahassee, FL (200 miles) - Take U. S. Hwy. 319 North to Thomasville, then U. S. Hwy. 19 to Albany. Proceed using directions listed above for Albany.

Georgia Poetry Society Volunteer Job Postings

Please seriously consider getting more involved as a volunteer leader in the Georgia Poetry Society. Contact Keith Badowski at georgiapoetrysociety@yahoo.com or call (334) 448-4715. Here are just a couple of job postings that urgently need to be filled by GPS members:

Youth Contest Chairperson: This job requires an enthusiastic desire to encourage children and youth to write poetry. Ideally we need someone with excellent contacts within the Georgia education system. The single most important factor in promoting the contest is getting the word out, so access to the

various e-mail list serves and publications used by educators would be a huge plus. However, it would be just as possible for the chairperson to contact those in the education system with those resources and recruit them to push the info out. The Youth Contest Chairperson finds and appoints a judge for the contest (which can be a GPS member), receives the entries, verifies that the contestants followed the rules, and ultimately reports back to the GPS President and GPS board with the winners. The chairperson is also in charge of contacting the winners and arranging for and hosting the awards presentation at the April quarterly meeting. Over the long-term, this chairperson would develop and maintain a database of teacher/educator contacts for future use-in cooperation with the Poetry in the Schools Coordinator.

Newsletter Editor: This job requires keen desire to "get the word out" about GPS events, especially the quarterly meetings. Ideally we need someone who has previously created newsletters, flyers, or press-releases for other organizations, however, it's perhaps even more important that person be highly skilled in using Word, Publisher, or some other software that can produce professional looking publications. The Newsletter Editor will need to produce 4 newsletters per year, usually one month before the quarterly meetings. The final product will need to be in PDF format for e-mail and website distribution. Also the newsletter will be printed and distributed as needed. The editor will mostly receive email announcements and articles that can be imported into the formatted document. The editor is also encouraged to actively seek and solicit articles and columns from the GPS membership. (See the most recent GPS newsletter for examples.)
